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City of Ottawa - Cultural Funding

The City of Ottawa values the contribution that local not-for-profit cultural organizations, professional artists and heritage workers make to our community and it annually invests in arts, heritage, and culture through 17 Cultural Funding and Awards Programs. These programs are managed by the Cultural Funding Support Unit (CFSU). All funds, except those administered through Purchase of Service Agreements, use a peer assessment model in the evaluation process, involving professionals who are active within their cultural community.

In 2019, the Cultural Funding Support Unit managed 452 funding and awards submissions, organized and held 32 juries bringing together 93 jurors, and used 2 independent assessors, which resulted in 321 funding allocations.

In total, over \$10.7 million dollars was invested into local arts, heritage and culture activities through CFSS programs.

2019 was also a year when our Unit increased its focus on issues around equity and inclusion. The CFSU worked with its newly established Equity and Inclusion Committee to identify barriers faced by equity-seeking applicants as they navigate City of Ottawa cultural funding programs. The Committee presented <u>7 recommendations</u> which will guide us as we move forward in renewing our funding framework beginning in 2020. Some recommendations were already implemented in 2019: outreach sessions held in Ottawa's neighbourhoods, opening up the Diversity in the Arts Program to individuals for 2020, infusing funds into the Capacity Building Program which was open to first-time applicants this year, hosting our first Gathering on Equity and Inclusion in the fall of 2019, and providing increased support for Algonquin Anishinabe Host Nation, First Nation, Inuit, and Métis applicants.

The Cultural Funding Support Unit would like to thank our Equity and Inclusion Committee members for their passion, wisdom and willingness to share their experiences. We look forward to broadening this circle as we work towards a renewed and more responsive cultural funding framework.

2019 Cultural Funding Support Unit Values

- The Cultural Funding Support Unit assists independent, local, not-for-profit organizations, as well as professional artists and heritage professionals in the presentation of arts and heritage events and activities that reflect a broad representation of communities within Ottawa.
- The City of Ottawa supports cultural activity that is inclusive of Ottawa's diverse community, including people from a diversity of ancestries, abilities, ages, countries of origin, cultures, genders, incomes, languages, races and sexual orientations.
- The City of Ottawa is built on unceded Algonquin Anishinabe territory. The CFSU honours the Algonquin Anishinabe Nation as host nation.
- Submissions from applicants reflecting Ottawa's diversity, as well as First Nations, Inuit and Métis are welcome and encouraged.
- The City of Ottawa recognizes both official languages as having the same rights, status and privileges, and therefore accepts applications in both English and French.

Ottawa Cultural Funding Per Capita (2013-2019)¹

Per capita means 'for each person' and per capita measurement expresses data as a measure per person within a defined geographic area. City of Ottawa cultural funding per capita measurement divides total municipal investment in cultural funding programs *(grants to the cultural community managed by the Cultural Funding and Support Unit)* by annual year-end City of Ottawa population. To be consistent with national per capita best practice reporting, major cultural facility capital grants (\$250,000 in 2019) are not included.

Arts Funding Program

The objective of the Arts Funding Program is to spark and support the creation, production, presentation, exhibition, and dissemination of the literary, performing, visual, and media arts, as well as independent film and video.

Operating and project funding is made available to professional and amateur organizations, while individual funding is accessible to professional artists of all disciplines. Funding from this program addresses the need to support arts education, arts training, community-based artistic activities, and professional groups that develop local arts audiences and provide valuable arts programs and services.

2019 was a reporting year for the organizations receiving three-year operating funding, and therefore, they did not go to jury for assessment.

Firestone Collection of Canadian Art Agreement

Originally established by Ottawa residents O.J. and Isobel Firestone in the early 1950s, the Firestone Collection of Canadian Art is a significant collection of works that spans the modern period (1900-1980). In 1972, the Firestone family donated their collection to the Ontario Heritage Foundation.

In 1992, the Foundation transferred ownership of this collection to the City of Ottawa with custodianship given to the Ottawa Art Gallery. The Ottawa Art Gallery receives funds through an agreement each year to care for, manage, and exhibit the City-owned Firestone Collection of Canadian Art.

Reconciliation Action Plan (Culture) Initiatives

In June 2015, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) released its findings and 94 Calls to Action to redress the residential schools legacy and advance the reconciliation process in Canada.

In February 2018, the City of Ottawa's Reconciliation Action Plan was approved. This plan addresses the TRC Calls to Action, confirms the City's commitment to reconciliation, and includes eight cultural action areas.

The City's Cultural Development and Initiatives (CDI) Unit has been working in collaboration with Algonquin Anishinabe Host Nation representatives since 2016 on the development of a City of Ottawa-Algonquin Anishinabe Nation civic cultural protocol. This protocol is one of the Reconciliation Action Plan (Culture) initiatives.

The establishment of an Algonquin Anishinabe Consultative Culture Circle represents the next step in Host Nation relationship-building and protocol advancement. The Circle

will facilitate City/Host Nation knowledge sharing, capacity-building and working partnerships in pursuit of good cultural practice and reconciliation.

Arms-Length Cultural Development Feasibility Study

In December 2016, Ottawa City Council approved, as part of the 2017 Budget, \$150,000 for "increased funding for the Arts, Heritage & Cultural Plan implementation." The Ottawa Cultural Alliance (Arts Network Ottawa, Capital Heritage Connexion, Heritage Ottawa, Ottawa Arts Council, Ottawa Festivals and Ottawa Museum Network) presented a proposal for the use of these funds where the Alliance would lead the development of an arms-length Feasibility Study to address the following items referenced in the *Renewed Action Plan for Arts, Heritage and Culture in Ottawa (2013-2018):*

To consult the Ottawa community and recommend potential models and/or solutions for Ottawa to collectively advance its cultural sector, such as:

- an independent arms-length, cultural authority to provide leadership, service and support;
- an arts and heritage foundation focused on fundraising and philanthropy to stimulate private sector support; and
- a roundtable to bring local, municipal, provincial and national cultural players together to address ways to better resource local culture.
