Getting started

Microfilm and microfiche were popular formats used to preserve copies of documents prior to the widespread use of computers. They are quite durable and easy to store due to their compact size. This format also allows people to access copies of documents that may have become fragile over time, and where the original items should not be handled to prevent them from being damaged.

Microfilm and microfiche both require a special reader to allow the user to view the documents. The only major difference between the two is that microfilms are reels of film kept on a spool, while microfiche are flat sheets. Reference staff can show clients how to use the microform equipment available in the Reference Room.
