Part II - Themes and Machine-Generated Topics

Expected Themes

The Sparks Street public realm team has identified several themes it expected to find through comments and responses made during the consultation process.

- Parking (on Sparks or area)
- Quality of the space (comfort, enjoyment, style, materials)
- Greenery (including sustainability, "urban oasis")
- History (heritage, culture, entertainment, Canadian identity)
- Business and store (shopping, destination)
- Tourism
- Cycling
- Winter (cold, wind...)
- Smoking
- Seating (patio...)
- Day/night (lighting...)
- Digital technology (wayfinding, interpretation, online "information desk")
- Aboriginal, Indigenous, Canada

Generating Topics through Machine Learning

To make sense of data from this survey, we have brought together 7275 responses in English coming from 1602 respondents to this survey (Questionnaire 2) with 229 responses from Questionnaire 1 and 389 comments from Town Hall meetings. We have used topic modelling analysis, a probabilistic method from Machine Learning, to automatically group these items in a limited set of categories. The machine was instructed to generate seven topics according to similarities it perceived in these items. Unlike themes, topics don't carry meaning. They can be understood as "buckets" of items which should belong together through statistical analysis of their content. Still, items grouped in these topics gain a lot of meaning together. We have labeled these seven topics based on some prominent words in the responses they contain.

- 1. Downtown Street
- 2. Cyclists and Pedestrians
- 3. Shopping
- 4. Events
- 5. Vehicle and Access
- 6. Amenities
- 7. Projects

In the table below, "Responses" corresponds to the number of answers in English to Questionnaire 2 which displayed a high relation to each topic (we have used a threshold of 70%). In other words, the machine has found 476 responses to Questionnaire 2 which displayed a high relevance to the first topic (which we have labelled "Downtown Street"). Other responses do relate to each topic, albeit to a lesser degree. This includes some responses which address more than one topic at a time. The score corresponds to the sum of these rates through the whole content. Including comments which may only relate tangentially to the first topic, the machine has calculated that the equivalent of 1970 items would have a 100% relationship to it (including 5993 responses which have less than 50% relation to the topic).

The top words are those terms which are most likely to be exclusive to that topic. For instance, the word "path" is unlikely to appear in the first topic as the machine found it to be highly exclusive to the second topic. Words like "history" and "Canada" rarely appear outside of Topic 7 (labelled "Projects").

- 7. Respondent 69 (Tourist, K1Y, Question 9. Vehicles) There is so much potential for making sparks street more inviting with relaxing areas, interactive places with greenery that will draw people to spend time there. This won't be possible if you are keeping areas for parking.
- 8. Respondent 358 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2C, Question 6. Likes) a pedestrian mall in downtown is a great idea. a pedestrian mall is part of a sustainable city. For example, times square in NY was converted a couple of years ago to be an area for pedestrians.
- 9. Respondent 377 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1C, Question 10. Other Thoughts) I think we must remember that Sparks St. is foremost a street and thus, a thoroughfare. It exists to move traffic from one destination to another. What makes it different is that is exclusively for pedestrians. This means the focus should be on the pedestrian and how to make moving along that street both pleasant, interesting and efficient. Build on the natural advantage that Sparks has as a thoroughfare: parallel to the Hill & LRT and running from Confed Sq.to the edge of Lebreton Flats





10. Respondent 695 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2S, Question 10. Other Thoughts) Make this a street again!! Close it down for special events, but for daily life and activities, this needs to be a true street (bank street, wellington etc.) and vehicular traffic is part of the street.

Topic 2. Cyclists and Pedestrians

- Respondent 187 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2A, Question 8. Cycling) I am a devoted cyclist. I definitely do not believe that this mall, which is relatively narrow, will accommodate cyclists and not disturb the stop and go flow of pedestrians, incl. children and older folks. Regardless that it may be pitched as slow speed cycling-once cyclists are moving through, it will not be slow cycling-what is the purpose of 'slow cycling?' Might at well walk, or walk your bike.
- Respondent 909 (Former Resident, K0J, Question 8. Cycling) Cyclists must cycle very slowly as a speed limit and always yield to pedestrians. The posted speed limit for cyclists maybe should be at 6 kph to ensure no one is collided. Sometimes cyclists may finder its easier to cycle than walking with their bike in case the are transporting an unusual heavy load of goods.
- Respondent 448 (Employee (Sparks), K1Z, Question 8. Cycling) Cyclists currently use sparks occasionally and it is very distracting and unexpected to pedestrians. Cyclists are weaving through crowds and as there is no road, pedestrians must predict their path. Cycling should occur on laurier or on a street. Sparks is meant for leisurely walking.
- 4. Respondent 996 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1L, Question 8. Cycling) I think cycling should be allowed because I think cycling ought to be encouraged wherever and whenever possible. But I also feel strongly that it should not become a place where cyclists see it as merely a route to pass through from point A to point B. Cyclists should be encouraged to see Sparks Street as an endpoint. And any cycling on the street itself should be slow and leisurely.
- 5. Respondent 1431 (Resident (Sparks), K1N, Question 8. Cycling) bicycles and I am a cyclist do not mix well with pedestrians in ottawa. pedestrians on a pedestrian street must feel they can cross and wander...and unpredictably ...feel they are are in a safe space. it is not hard to push a bike a few blocks.
- Respondent 32 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1N, Question 8. Cycling) Cyclists riding in a designated section of Sparks street makes sense if the city wants to make cycling a priority, as they will be away from cars/traffic which is a major obstacle for people to commute by bicycle.
- 7. Respondent 394 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1H, Question 8. Cycling) While cycling may not 'be allowed' it doesn't seem to stop the cyclists. Define 'slow speed'. Some cyclists won't pay attention to 'slow speed', and would endanger pedestrians.
- Respondent 44 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1S, Question 8. Cycling) Maybe create a lane for bikes so it remains essentially pedestrian. For bikes...it would be convenient as Wellington has a lot of buses and Laurier is several blocks away. Sparks could help the bicycle path network.
- 9. Respondent 610 (Resident (Sparks), K2P, Question 8. Cycling) If cycling is allowed, there should be a bike lane the lane should probably have 'curbs' of some sort, rather than just lines painted on the ground so that pedestrians don't absent-mindedly wander into the bike lane.
- 10. Respondent 1022 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2R, Question 8. Cycling) Cyclists already share the road with cars they should not be allowed on a pedestrian only street. They are

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dangerous and cyclists already don't follow the rules of the road, why would they follow a 'slow-speed' rule?

Topic 3. Shopping

- 1. Respondent 745 (Resident (Sparks), K1Y, Question 4. Other Amenities) Higher quality business in the area less offices and more reasons for me to GO to sparks street. Also higher quality food options (healthy as well). Less 'tourist trap' places and more pop up shops of local makers and entrepreneurs
- Respondent 235 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1Z, Question 5. Dislikes) Poor shopping & dead at night. You need to attract residents, not just services for public servants or tourists. More thinking outside the box: interactive, international, busking, amaze people, give us something unique.
- 3. Respondent 955 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2P, Question 5. Dislikes) That the stores are all the same type of stores (souvenir, jewelry), and are never open late. We need to make the street a destination at all times of day. We also need stores that will attract people to the area.
- 4. Respondent 1095 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1C, Question 10. Other Thoughts) Curated selection of stores, make it a place people come because of the good or different selection. Subsidized rent for interesting or local stores, so that we can make the ambiance and experience good for people. In order to get lower rent they must say why they think they will attract people to sparks, stay open late, stay open all weekend, etc
- 5. Respondent 206 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2A, Question 5. Dislikes) Fewer destination stores than in the past -- lost Zellers, lost the Scottish store and some great clothing shops, the bookstore.
- 6. Respondent 1328 (Resident (Sparks), K1R, Question 5. Dislikes) Most of the really interesting and useful shops and services have closed. The lack of retail outlets is a real deficit for a downtown area. One used to be able to buy almost anything at places like Zellers, Simpsons, Holt Renfrew, and Marks and Spencer's. Now it is a shopping wasteland (other than for Winners). The federal government (if it ever finishes its endless construction) should hire a retail impresario to find a variety of retailers and locate them strategically on the north side.
- 7. Respondent 1161 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2B, Question 5. Dislikes) It's not like I dislike it, I just have no reason to go there unless for some reason I need to get food in that area. The businesses are uninteresting and/or unaffordable to me as a middle-class woman in her mid-twenties.
- 8. Respondent 1683 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1C, Question 5. Dislikes) Not visually appealing and only geared to attract a small segment of the total population, local employees and merchants who want to attract them.
- Respondent 606 (Employee (Sparks), K1H, Question 5. Dislikes) It's just horribly uninviting. I never go down Sparks Street when I have errands to run cause there is nothing there. And 9 our of -0 Times, I pick a restaurant elsewhere cause there are so many better ones on other nearby streets.
- 10. Respondent 937 (Employee (Sparks), K2H, Question 5. Dislikes) All the construction, lack of useful stores for people working there i.e. no grocery store and not many good eating establishments.





Topic 4. Events

- 1. Respondent 448 (Employee (Sparks), K1Z, Question 6. Likes) Festivals (rib fest, poutine fest,...) Always draw crowds. The hockey art display installation is an improvement too as it lights up at night.
- 2. Respondent 268 (Resident (Sparks), K1R, Question 5. Dislikes) Hate rib fest and other junky fairs. Hate canned music at all times. Hate cars Hate those hideous giant tulips.
- 3. Respondent 352 (Resident (Sparks), K1R, Question 6. Likes) Seasonal events are great (rib fest, poutine fest, the Canada people posters that were up this year) nice to just walk through and take time.
- 4. Respondent 1713 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1N, Question 6. Likes) I really like the events that have been planned over the last few years like Latin nights and New Year's Eve parties and big screens to watch sports, etc.
- 5. Respondent 746 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1N, Question 10. Other Thoughts) Art exhibits, fairs. New talent days. Dancing. Buskers, of course. Gourmet trucks. Book fair.
- 6. Respondent 1437 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2L, Question 6. Likes) Canada Day, Remembrance Day, BBQ days, Buskers performances, very occasional restaurant meal
- 7. Respondent 1573 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1S, Question 6. Likes) Ribfest, Poutinefest, Buskerfest. They should add on a Foodtruckfest, a Stew/Soup Cookoff Fest, and an Arts and Crafts Fest.
- 8. Respondent 622 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), J8V, Question 6. Likes) Great place for special events (Ribfest, busker fest). Good place for lunch in the summer.
- 9. Respondent 1301 (Employee (Sparks), K2A, Question 6. Likes) The special Events, The live music at night, The seating areas that have started showing up (outside goodlife)
- Respondent 1689 (Employee (Sparks), K1J, Question 6. Likes) The various "-fests" Ribfest, Poutinefest, Buskerfest, etc. Christmas decorations. Statues (eg, bear, Stanley Cup)

Topic 5. Vehicle and Access

- Respondent 1276 (Resident (Sparks), K2P, Question 5. Dislikes) Vehicles of all kinds driving on it. Ban all vehicles INCLUDING DELIVERY VEHICLES. Deliveries can be made by parking on adjacent streets and using loading docks on adjacent streets. The only way to efficiently ban all vechilces it to make it physically impossible for them to get onto the mall - so BOLLARDS at EVERY intersection.
- 2. Respondent 919 (Employee (Sparks), K1M, Question 5. Dislikes) Traffic. It is a pedestrian mall, and yet daily during high traffic times pedestrians needs to deal with cars and delivery trucks driving down the street, or parking in the middle of the street. It makes the street uninviting.
- 3. Respondent 425 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1S, Question 9. Vehicles) Whether it's for evenings and/or winter months, the street would have to be designed for cars even if there were no cars permitted during the day and/or warmer months, i.e., it would become a 'street' that happens to permit pedestrians during the day and/or the warmer months.
- 4. Respondent 1119 (Resident (Sparks), K2P, Question 9. Vehicles) 'Currently, vehicles allowed on Sparks Street are limited to emergency vehicles, loading and deliveries during specific times' anyone who goes to Sparks At knows that this statement is totally wrong. There are cars parked at anytime any day of the week. Current no parking bylaws are not enforced. Allowing the cars for evening or winter months would just have for consequences to have more cars at all times. Allowing cars will just prevent animations or spaces to be designed for pedestrians.



- 5. Respondent 398 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2C, Question 9. Vehicles) Extending access periods is just confusing. There are enough intersecting streets that people can do drop offs. If you are going to extend vehicle hours just allow them all the time and scrap the pedestrian mall concept.
- 6. Respondent 1631 (Employee (Sparks), K4K, Question 9. Vehicles) Same as above, it's supposed to be for pedestrians, so improving pedestrian amenities is key. I understand that some vehicles need access at certain times but I wouldn't want to increase the amount of time vehicles spend on Sparks.
- 7. Respondent 1580 (Employee (Sparks), K1S, Question 4. Other Amenities) Fewer motor vehicles, trucks, vans, pickup trucks at present the street is always crowded with motor vehicles during peak times of pedestrian usage
- 8. Respondent 1076 (Resident (Sparks), K2P, Question 9. Vehicles) The intent of Sparks is to be a pedestrian friendly area. As an example, Lansdowne was also supposed to be pedestrian friendly, but has been taken over by cars due to the high access they've been given. This deters me as a pedestrian from using the space as it was intended.
- 9. Respondent 1472 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1C, Question 9. Vehicles) Get vehicles off the street, too many at peak times of day especially trades. Deliveries should be scheduled before and after peak periods, use side street (loading zones enforced).
- 10. Respondent 954 (Employee (Sparks), K1N, Question 9. Vehicles) I already find the amount of vehicles on Sparks to be incredibly high and would not want to see an increase. Especially during construction periods when sidewalk size is reduced, I have found it difficult to get around parked and moving vehicles on Sparks.

Topic 6. Amenities

- 1. Respondent 976 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1L, Question 5. Dislikes) The god-awful hodgepodge of surface treatment, especially the awful, stupid pavers that heave in the frost, become tripping hazards, and constantly have to be replaced and repaired. STOP USING PAVERS.
- 2. Respondent 1592 (Employee (Sparks), K1R, Question 5. Dislikes) no trees or other plant material. Paving material in poor shape. Limited furnishings, eg. benches, places to sit.
- 3. Respondent 1201 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2H, Question 5. Dislikes) the constant construction, the poor (even hazardous) condition of the sidewalks, the lack of greenery, not enough benches/seating areas, the lack of a 'pulse'!
- 4. Respondent 808 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1C, Question 5. Dislikes) Lack of surface maintenance ie broken concrete, uneven surfaces. Wind tunnel effect.
- 5. Respondent 1410 (Resident (Sparks), K1R, Question 6. Likes) patios, seating areas, need trees, need bird feeders or bird houses for song birds
- 6. Respondent 1622 (Employee (Sparks), K2H, Question 5. Dislikes) State of the infrastructure. Lack of diversity. Cold wind chills from tunnel effect
- 7. Respondent 396 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1V, Question 5. Dislikes) Missing pizazz, feels cold/uninviting, little to no greenery, no public washrooms, too few public seating
- 8. Respondent 135 (Employee (Sparks), K1P, Question 5. Dislikes) Weather condition, icy sidewalks, no heating seating outside for office lunches
- 9. Respondent 950 (Employee (Sparks), K1S, Question 5. Dislikes) It is a cold wind tunnel, no trees, or inviting creative green spaces
- 10. Respondent 614 (Employee (Sparks), K1Y, Question 10. Other Thoughts) In terms of design, the pavement, the flower boxes, the lighting and the benches are ugly and use



materials which are mismatched and outdated. Just fixing that would help make the area more attractive.

Topic 7. Projects

- Respondent 741 (Employee (Sparks), K2J, Question 7. Collaboration) [...] Working in projects, I use a online/web based collaborative app that keeps me and the team in sync. I would be happy to share that info if needed. This app allows members to share ideas and assign individual tasks, and the ability to follow other's assigned tasks. Being from Toronto, I can see that Ottawa is a tough crowd. Good luck on bringing life to Sparks St! This city needs it!
- Respondent 302 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1N, Question 7. Collaboration) Architects, Urban Designers and Conservation (heritage and sustainability) specialists with experience in public realm design, flexible exhibit design, Eco-District design, interventions into historic places design, cultural landscapes, public art, etc. Would be a valuable member of the concept-programming-design team.
- 3. Respondent 428 (Resident (Sparks), K1N, Question 7. Collaboration) I may be interested in landscape and architecture interventions like the Stanley Cup tribute that is going in, or some ephemeral/temporary design ideas competition. [...]
- 4. Respondent 9 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K2P, Question 10. Other Thoughts) Talk to Jim Mountain from the National Trust for Canada. His urbanism class at Carleton did a great study on these exact things a few years ago (2014) and offered many practical ideas and inspirations such as those already discussed here among others you may not have considered.
- 5. Respondent 1715 (Resident (Sparks), K1R, Question 7. Collaboration) I work for the Department of National Defence. So I would love to see some history from each department. - 8. Respondent 805 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1E, Question 7. Collaboration) Planning and design ideas. [...] Individual/private citizen
- 9. Respondent 1194 (Resident (Ottawa/Gatineau), K1S, Question 7. Collaboration) I am happy to provide input, be a member of focus group, etc... [...]
- 10. Respondent 1631 (Employee (Sparks), K4K, Question 7. Collaboration) We have a group at work (National Capital Commission) already collaborating with the City on this initiative.
