If you are coming downtown, consider using the Free OC Transpo Shuttle to help you get around to nearly 50 locations.





1. AIDS Committee of Ottawa

19 Main St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The AIDS Committee of Ottawa (ACO) has served the HIV/AIDS community for over 30 years, providing education and support services around HIV/AIDS. Built in 1961 and overlooking the Rideau Canal, the home of the ACO features a drop-in centre known as the Living Room – a place of comfort and care that pays tribute to the origins of the HIV/AIDS movement in Canada in the early '80s. W, D, P, F, B, T, OCT.

2. allsaints Event Space

317 Chapel St.

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Once the site of Canada's only royal wedding, and the parish of many prominent Canadians, including The Right Honourable Sir Robert Borden, allsaints was recently purchased by a unique partnership of businesses and local residents. Together, they are working to lovingly restore this national historic building and renew it as a multi-purpose urban event space. allsaints features stunning WWI memorial stained glass windows, beautifully repointed stone, and a rare nine-bell chime in the tower. **3. All Saints Anglican Church, Greely
ASG**

7103 Parkway Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Built in 1889, on land donated by Richard Stanley, All Saints Greely was dedicated in honour of those saintly persons who have no special day in the year. This small church has 10 stained glass windows, 16 benches for a congregation of 75 parishioners in a 635 sq. ft. nave, an 80 sq. ft. altar & a 575 sq. ft. hall for events, facilities and storage. Weekly services are held Sunday at 9 am. W, D, P, F, B, T.

4. Bank of Canada

234 Wellington St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The Bank of Canada's head office on Wellington Street combines classic and modern architecture. Doors Open visitors can tour the striking garden atrium designed by renowned Canadian architect Arthur Erickson as well as the art deco marble lobby from the 1930s. The Bank of Canada Museum will also offer interactive exhibitions for all ages. Visit bankofcanada.ca/doors-open for more information. W, D, F, S, OCT.

**5. Barry Padolsky Associates Inc.
Architects, Mercury Court Building**

377 Dalhousie St., Suite 202

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Originally built in 1923 as Larocque's Department Store, Mercury Court was renovated and expanded by Barry Padolsky Associates Inc. Architects from 1989 to 1993; it is now home to this architectural firm. Features include the "Flying Mercury" weathervane, which adorned the Sun Life Building at Bank and Sparks Streets until 1949. W, D, F, \$P, S, OCT.

6. Beckta Dining & Wine Bar

150 Elgin St., Unit 100

Sat. 10 am to 2 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Beckta is a landmark fine dining restaurant that relocated to the historic Grant House in November of 2014. The building has a heritage designation for both the interior and exterior, and was the home and workplace of Dr. James Grant, Canada's first Surgeon General. The building has also housed the University Club of Ottawa as well as Friday's Roast Beef House. W, D, F, B, \$P, T, S, OCT.

7. Beechwood Cemetery **New**

280 Beechwood Ave.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 3 pm

Founded in 1873, Beechwood was designated a National Historic Site in 2001 because of its key role in Canadian heritage. It is a reflection of Canada's identity as a multicultural and multi-faith society. Over 400 famous burials reside on the grounds including politicians, writers, and inventors.

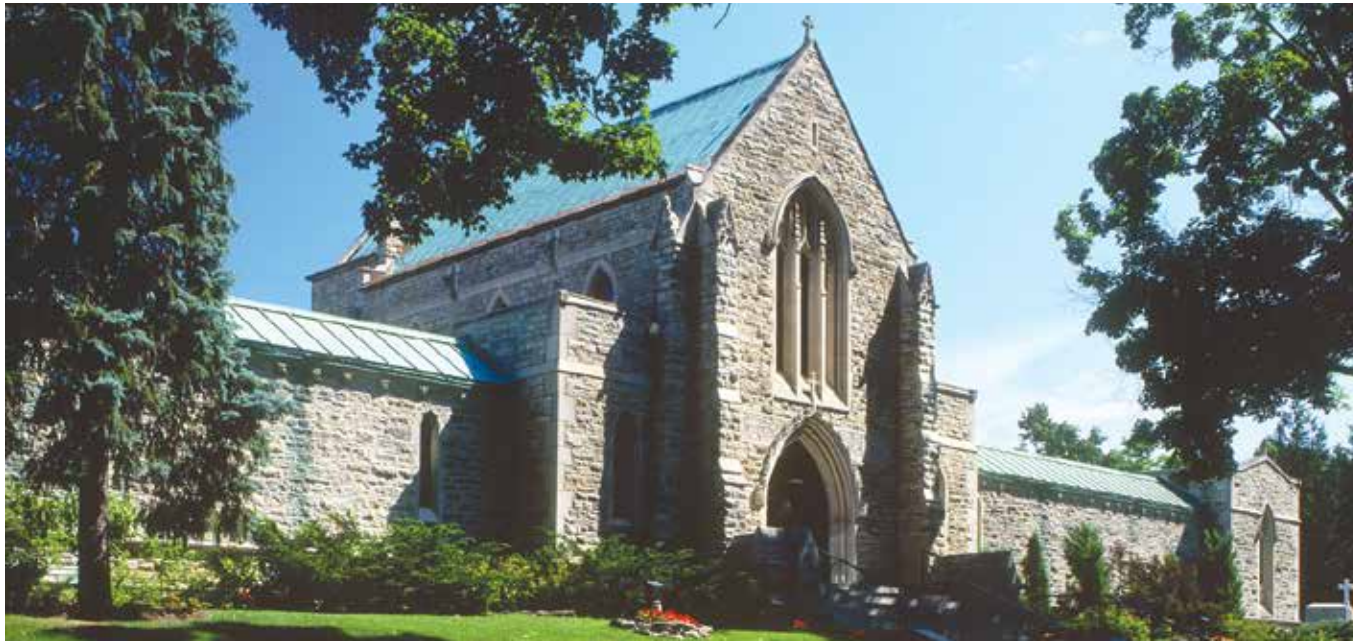

**8. Billings Estate Artefact Collection
Storage**

172 Guigues St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Explore behind the scenes of the Billings Estate National Historic Site artefact collection, listen to the stories these treasures tell, and learn how the City of Ottawa cares for historic artefacts. Experience pieces from the past first hand by investigating an object and seeing what secrets you can unlock! W, D, P, F, B, T, S, OCT.

9. Billings Estate National Historic Site

2100 Cabot St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Braddish Billings, the first settler of Gloucester Township, built Ottawa's oldest wood-frame house, Billings Estate National Historic Site, from 1827-1829. Learn about the architectural details as you tour the home from basement to attic and learn about the evolution of the property. Explore the history of transportation in Ottawa from canoes to country roads in a new special exhibition, City in Motion. W, D, P, F, B, T, OCT.

10. Bridgehead Roastery

130 Anderson St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Bridgehead restored the beauty and character of this original structure, which was a carriage stable built in the 1920s, to use as the roastery that supplies fair trade and organic coffee to all 20 of their Ottawa locations. Main level accessible. Roastery open Mon. to Sun. 6:30 am to 8 pm W, D, F, B, \$P, T, S, OCT.

11. Britannia Yacht Club

2777 Cassels St. (North side of Tennis Courts at the end of Cassels St.)

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Established in 1887, the newly renovated clubhouse boasts the beautiful Dragon Lounge where visitors can see a unique bar fashioned out of a dragon sailboat. Visitors will notice a large stone tower that is part of the original structure. Despite additions, the clubhouse still retains its historic appearance. It offers one of the best views of the Ottawa River that is enjoyed by our members year round. W, D, P, F, B, OCT.

12. BYTOWN Museum: Commissariat Building

1 Canal Lane

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Discover the secrets hidden within Ottawa's oldest stone building, the Commissariat, home of the BYTOWN MUSEUM in this special behind-the-scenes tour! Learn all about this spectacular heritage building from the foundation to the rafters, the vault, and stories of its former uses and inhabitants. One hundred and ninety-one years later, this building still has much to tell. W, D, F, B, T, S, OCT.

13. Canada Aviation and Space Museum - Reserve Hangar

11 Aviation Pkwy.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The Reserve Hangar is home to over 60 aircraft and unique artefacts. The visit is self-guided and takes approximately 45 minutes. Staff and volunteers will be stationed throughout the Reserve Hangar to offer interpretation. Please note that there is a maximum visitor capacity to the Reserve Hangar which may cause wait times to access the building. W, D, F, B, \$P.

14. Canada Council Art Bank

921 St. Laurent Blvd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The Canada Council Art Bank is home to over 17,000 contemporary Canadian artworks, including paintings, works on paper, sculpture and fibre works. The Art Bank offers Canadians unique public access to original art through its three programs – art rental, museum loans and outreach projects. Enjoy a behind-the-scenes tour of the Art Bank with art experts and view a thematic display of artworks related

to transportation and the environment in the lead-up to the opening of Ottawa's Light Rail Transit System (LRT). W, D, P, F, B, T, OCT.

15. Canadian Conservation Institute

1030 Innes Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Discover the fascinating world of heritage conservation and conservation science! Learn how the Canadian Conservation Institute supports museums, archives, and historic sites of Canada in conserving our heritage collections so they can be accessed by current and future generations. W, D, P, B, OCT.

16. Canadian Space Services

2336 Craig's Side Rd., Carp

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

In 1960, NATO and the Canadian Department of National Defence built this satellite communications (SATCOM) station. Supporting a 68-ft. diameter metal space frame radar dome on its roof, it provides environmental protection for the 50-ft. diameter SATCOM antenna it houses. The antenna provided satellite communications between all NATO countries until 1999. It is now headquarters for the Canadian Space Services Ltd., CSS Wind Inc., and Rocky Mountain Equipment Ltd. 17. Cancer research lab at The Ottawa Hospital

501 Smyth Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Discover fascinating cancer research with a behind-the-scenes tour of a research lab at The Ottawa Hospital Cancer Centre. Don a lab coat to explore the lab's high-tech tools. For safety reasons, **visitors must be 16 years or older**. Forty-minute guided tours leave every hour from the Cancer Centre lobby. Space is limited, registration is required. **Pre-register at www.ottawahospital.on.ca/doorsopen.** W, D, P, B, T, OCT.

18. Carleton Masonic Lodge 465

3704 Carp Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The original lodge was built in 1904, but was destroyed by the great fire in Carp in 1920. The current building was originally the old Presbyterian Church located in Carp and was purchased to replace the lodge lost in the fire. Accentuated by original stained glass windows, it has been the Village of Carp's Masonic Lodge since 1925. The lodge's interior features beautiful oak furniture used by a military Masonic Lodge in France during WWI. W, D, P, F, B, T.

19. Carp Exhibit Hall

3790 Carp Rd., Carp

Sat. 8 am to 1 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The red painted frame building with white trim remains a focal point in the Carp area to this day. One of the few remaining octagonal fairground buildings once so popular in Ontario, it continues to function as the main hall for the Carp Fair, and the popular Carp Farmers' Market. W, D, P, F, B.

20. Centre de services Guigues

159 Murray St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

École Guigues played a leading role in the development of Franco-Ontarian identity and collective memory. Having served Franco-Ontarian youth as a centre of learning for more than a century, École Guigues is one of the best-known French-language schools in Francophone Ontario. With origins dating back to 1864, the school is located on Murray Street in Lowertown. W, D, P, F, B, \$P, T, S, OCT.

21. Christ Church Bells Corners Chapel & Cemetery

3861 Old Richmond Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. 12 pm to 4 pm

The Bells Corners Union Cemetery dates from 1853 and is located on land given by the founder of the community, Hugh Bell. In 1876, the Anglican congregation built their church, which is still in use every Sunday. Visitors will hear stories behind the stained glass, the wood paneling and a variety of personages in the cemetery as they complete a guided tour and enjoy a Historical Strawberry Tea. W, D, P, F, B, T, OCT.

22. Christ Church Cathedral Ottawa

414 Sparks St.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The original parish of Christ Church Bytown was established in 1832 on uncaded Algonquin territory. In 1870, architect King Arnoldi was commissioned to build a bigger church in the English Gothic style to harmonize with the new Parliament buildings. Named the Cathedral of the Diocese in 1897, it continues to nurture faith in creative and traditional ways, and is often used for ecumenical, interfaith and state events. W, D, P, F, B, \$P, T, S, OCT.

23. Church of St. Bartholomew

125 MacKay St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Founded in 1867, the heritage designated church was designed by architect Thomas Seaton Scott on land donated by the estate of Thomas MacKay, founder of New Edinburgh. Discover artefacts about the local community, Canada's Governor Generals and the Governor General's Foot Guards. Highlights include the Memorial East Window by Wilhelmina Geddes (1919) and the new Létourneau organ (2013). D, P, F, B, OCT.

24. City of Ottawa Archives, Rideau Branch

6581 Fourth Line Rd., North Gower

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Rideau Archives is in the former Township Hall of North Gower, built in 1876; a one-storey, brick-faced example of a modest hall with fine proportions, careful detailing and a cupola. The archival collection highlights material from the southern rural part of Ottawa. The current exhibit commemorates the service and sacrifice of Rideau's citizens in the Great War, 1914 to 1918. W, D, P, F, B.

25. City of Ottawa Spay/Neuter Clinic

5-26 Concourse Gate

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

For almost 40 years, the City of Ottawa Spay/Neuter Clinic has been helping cats and dogs live better lives through sterilization. During Doors Open Ottawa, the City invites you to take a tour to learn how the Clinic provides affordable service without sacrificing quality of care. W, D, P, F, T, OCT.

26. CKCU FM

1125 Colonel By Dr., Room 517, 5th Floor,

University Centre

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

CKCU is Canada's oldest campus community radio station. It broadcasts live 24 hours a day to a 100 km radius on FM 93.1 and around the world on ckcufm.com. Enjoy station tours with the hosts to learn about the world of radio. Parking lot 2 is the closest parking lot and will cost around \$4. Buses and the O-Train stop on campus. It is also accessible via city bike paths. W, D, F, B, \$P, T, OCT.

27. Connaught Building

555 MacKenzie Ave.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Built in Modified Norman style and designed by David Ewart, Connaught opened in 1915 and was named after the Duke of Connaught, third son of Queen Victoria and Governor General of Canada 1911 to 1916. Designated as a Classified federal heritage building, primarily for its architectural significance, the structure is considered to be the "Crown Jewel" of the Canada Revenue Agency. Access is limited to the Mackenzie lobby area and the 8th floor executive boardroom. W, D, B, \$P, S, OCT.

28. Cumberland Heritage Village Museum

2940 Old Montreal Rd.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Cumberland Heritage Village Museum offers historic and reproduction buildings clustered on picturesque grounds depicting rural life in the 1920s and 1930s. Tour an operational sawmill and blacksmith shop, a one-room school house, a 1927 Imperial Gas garage, a 1904 church and family homes. Explore the history of transportation in Ottawa from Railways to Highways in our new exhibition, City in Motion. W, D, P, F, B.

29. Dickinson House

1127 Mill St., Manotick

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Built in 1867, the year of Canada's Confederation, by M.K. Dickinson, founder of the village of Manotick, this 150-year-old house was the residence, from 1870 to 1972 of the Dickinson, Spratt and Watson families, owner/operators of the grist mill across the square. The house was visited by Sir John A. Macdonald during the 1887 General Election. D, P, F, B, T.

30. Diefenbunker: Canada's Cold War Museum

3929 Carp Rd.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The Diefenbunker: Canada's Cold War Museum is a four-storey Cold War bunker built to protect the government from a nuclear attack on Ottawa. Once top-secret, this underground facility is now open year-round. Free tours in French and English by reservation only. **Please visit www.diefenbunker.ca in early May to reserve your space.** W, D, P, F, B, T.

31. Discovery Centre, Carleton University

1125 Colonel By Dr., MacOdrum Library, 4th Floor

Sat. 12 pm to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The Discovery Centre is a 9,500 square foot collaborative workspace for undergraduate research. This dynamic learning environment is outfitted with ergonomic, accessible and stylish furniture as well as state-of-the-art technology. Complete with three Library Laboratories (Gaming, Learning, Multi-Media) available for student and faculty use, this multi-purpose space can suit a wide range of needs. W, D, \$P, OCT.

32. Dominican University College

96 Empress Ave.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. 1 pm to 4 pm

The stone structure of Dominican University College displays the vaulted ceilings typical of neo-Gothic design. An interior courtyard visible through large windows opens onto elegant gardens. The highly reputed library is distinguished by its stained glass and the Wilson Room, dedicated to antiquated books dating back to the 15th century. W, D, P, F, B, T, S, OCT.

33. Dormition of the Virgin Mary Greek Orthodox Church

1315 Prince of Wales Dr.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 2 pm

Built in 1975, and designed by architect Konstantinos Zourdoumis. A fine example of Neo-Byzantine style with its domed structure. Highlights include hand-painted Byzantine icons on the domed ceiling and walls, the hand-carved wood Iconostasion wall of icons in front of the Altar, and mosaic tiles. Photography permitted. Services at 10 am on Sunday. W, D, P, F, B, OCT.

34. Elections Canada Distribution Centre

440 Coventry Rd.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Completed in 1968, the building at 440 Coventry was designed as a headquarters for both the Canadian Exhibition Commission and Canada's Chief Electoral Officer. Today, it is still home to the Elections Canada Distribution Centre, where almost all of the materials used across the country in a federal election or by-election are received, stored, packed and shipped. W, D, P, F, B, OCT.

35. Embassy of Algeria, Fleck-Paterson House

500 Wilbrod St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The house was built in 1901 by J.R. Booth for his daughter, Gertrude Fleck. The house remained Mrs. Fleck's private residence until her death in 1940. It was then purchased by Senator Norman Paterson, who lived in it until his death in 1983. The house was bought by the Algerian Embassy in 2002 and is now used as a chancery. W, P, B, S, OCT.

36. Embassy of Hungary Ottawa

306 Metcalfe St.

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The Embassy of Hungary is located in the historic Birkett Castle which was built in 1896 by Mr. Thomas Birkett, who served as Mayor of Ottawa. The building was built in the Baronial Gothic style, features towers, a crenellated roofline, wood panelling, a variety of fine ornaments, and stained glass windows. It was acquired by the Government of Hungary in 1994. W, F, \$P, S, OCT.

37. Embassy of the Czech Republic

251 Cooper St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

The construction of the building dates back to 1879, and is typical of late Victorian vernacular architecture in North America. In 1913 it was enlarged to twice its size. The Liberal Federation took it over in 1957 as their headquarters. The University Club bought the property in 1970. Starting 2000, this building became the Czech Embassy. In 2006, portions of the Embassy were carefully renovated. Guided tours on ground floor only. W, F, B, \$P, S, OCT.

38. Embassy of the Republic of Croatia

229 Chapel St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

Known as Toller House, it was built in the Domestic Gothic Revival style by Henry Horsey and J. Sheard, architects in 1875. The building was home to many dignitaries including Frederic Toller, Auditor General of the Dominion's Currency in the 1880s. In 1999, it opened as the Embassy of Croatia after an award-winning restoration. Guided tours on ground level only. F, P, S, OCT.

39. Enriched Bread Artists

951 Gladstone Ave.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Enriched Bread Artists is celebrating its 26th year in the former Standard Bread Company building. Opened in 1924, the building's plaque with the Latin proverb: Audaces Fortuna Juvat meaning Fortune Favours the Bold, can still be seen near the entrance. It is now home to artists' studios boldly continuing to sustain Ottawa. W, P, F, S, OCT.

40. Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Paul

210 Wilbrod St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. CLOSED

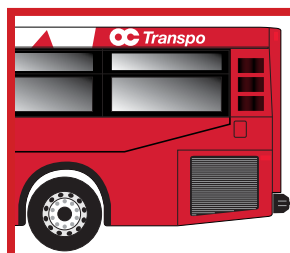
In 1887, A. Harvey designed a new limestone Gothic Revival church to replace a modest frame church built in 1875. The cornerstone was laid on May 21, 1888. Renowned architect W.E. Noffke oversaw renovations in 1948. Further renovations were completed in 2015. In 2017, the church celebrated the 500th year anniversary of the Reformation. W, D, P, F, B, S, OCT.

41. Faculty of Medicine, University of Ottawa (Roger Guindon Hall - RGN)

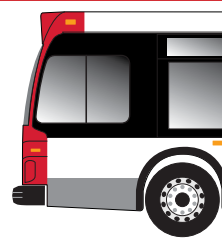
451 Smyth Rd.

Sat. CLOSED/Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Founded in 1945, uOttawa's Faculty of Medicine is a leader in medical education and research. With 1,000 + rooms including labs and state-of-the-art facilities, RGN is home to physicians-in-training, aspiring scientists, and some of Canada's top researchers. Hear from uOBMRI and C13 researchers about their fascinating discoveries in the treatment of brain-related illness and infections and inflammatory diseases. Guided tours (En). Min age : 6yrs. W, D, P, F, B, \$P, T, OCT.

42. Fairfields Heritage House

44. First Church of Christ, Scientist

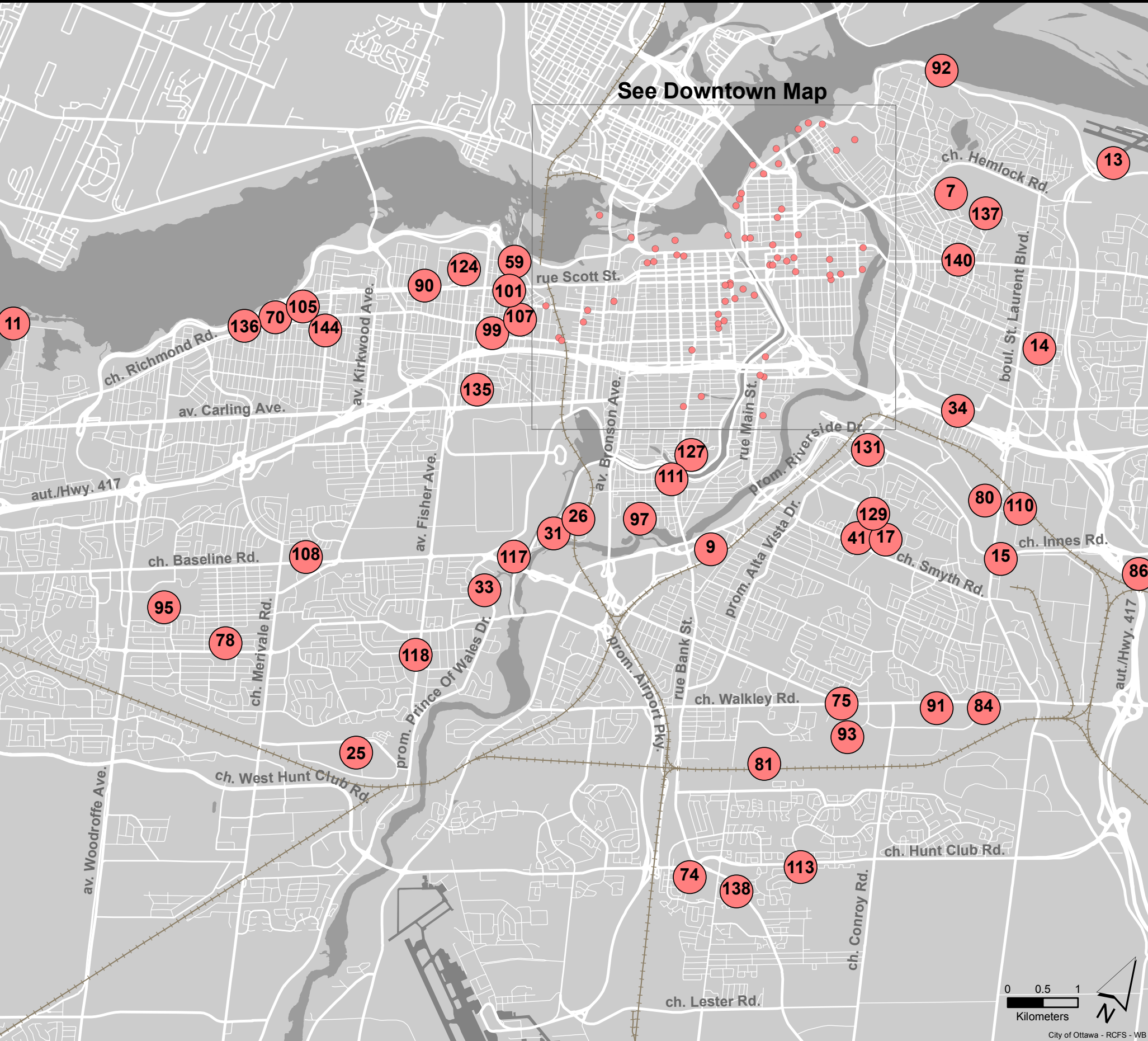

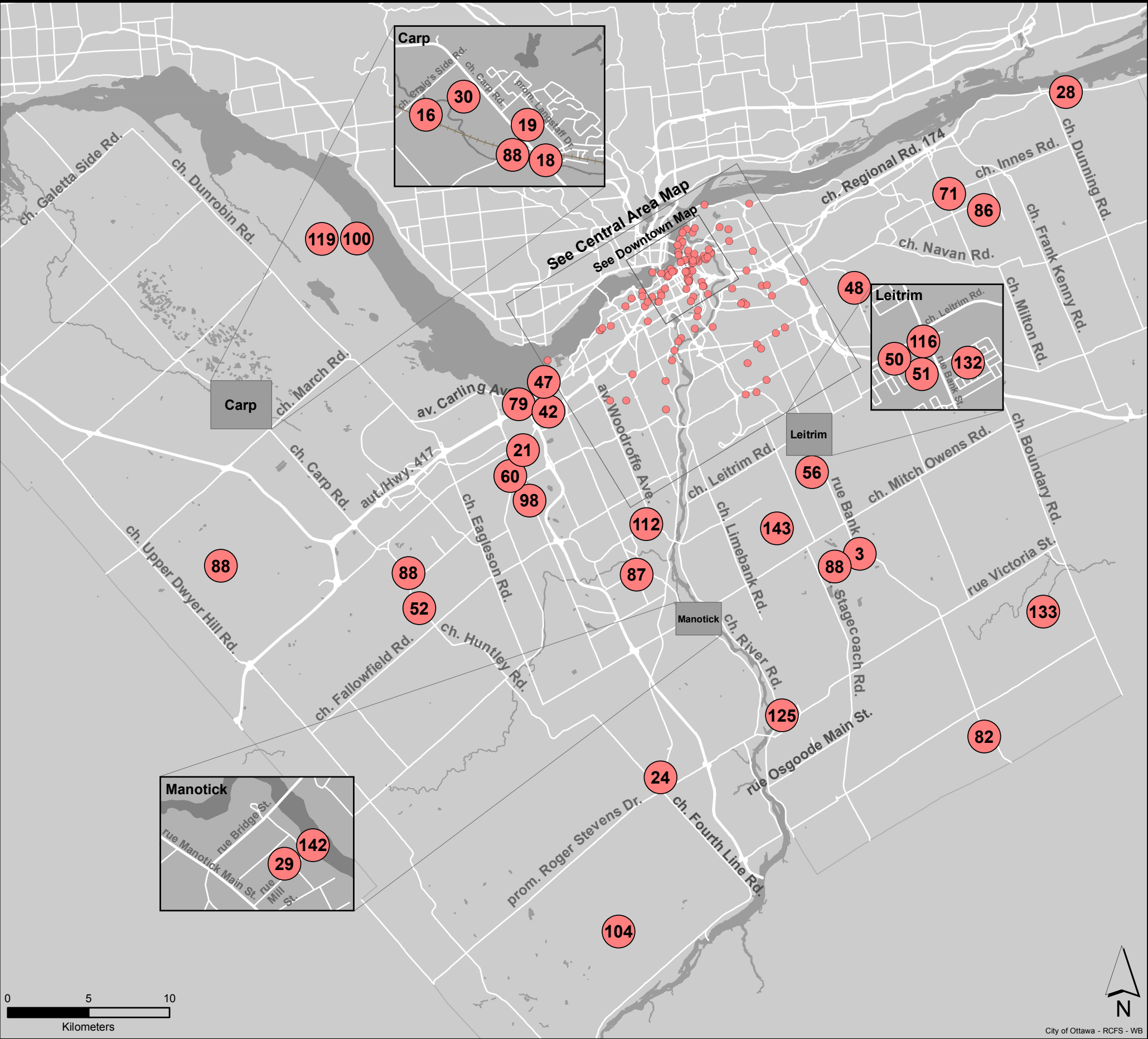

Visit the heart of the building, a beautiful shrine where marvelous Buddha statues can be admired, and learn about meditation programs helping people to develop inner peace and good hearts. Previously owned by the Laurentian Club, it's now the Laurentian Leadership Centre of Trinity Western University. W, D, P, F, B, \$P, T, S, OCT.

66. Laurier House National Historic Site

335 Laurier Ave. E.
Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 5 pm

Laurier House commemorates two of Canada's most notable prime ministers, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King. For over fifty years, from 1897 to 1948, the house occupied a central position in the political life of Canada, as the place of residence of Laurier and, after his death, of Mackenzie King. 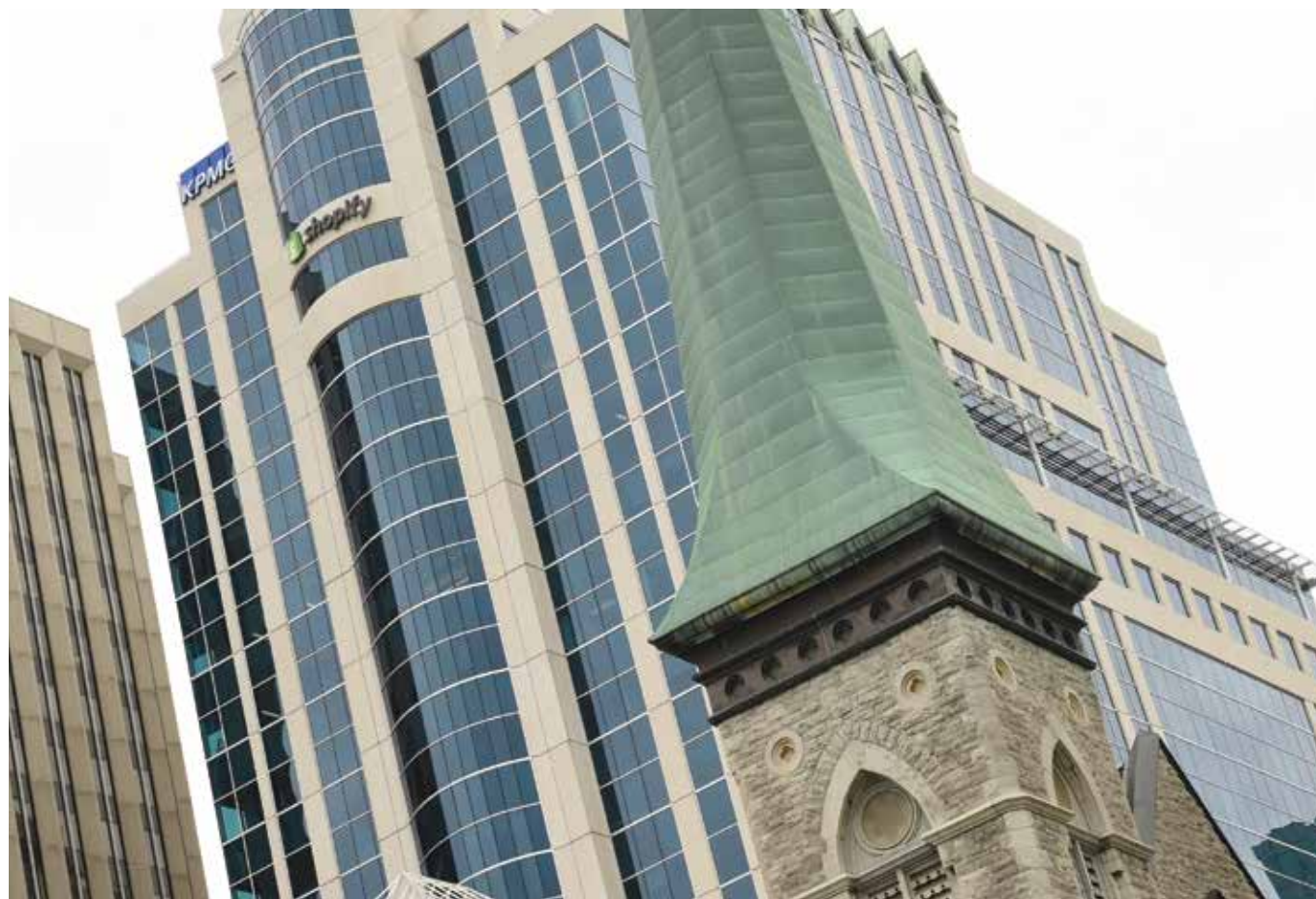

118. St. Mark the Evangelist Anglican Church

St. Mark's was built in 1954 by renowned architect James W. Strutt. The church hall was built in 1966. The church has unique construction of nine A-frames of British-Columbian fir with a large sloping cedar roof. One end wall is filled by glass windows, while the other at the Sanctuary end is entirely made of cedar. The roof has a large solar panel cross that generates power for the church. St. Paul's-Eastern United Church is one of the oldest congregations in Ottawa. The Romanesque Revival church was built from 1888 to 1889 for St. Paul's Presbyterian Church by S.R. Badgley, architect. It originally had a large steeple. Unfortunately the church was built on sand and the steeple had to be removed, leaving a more squat building. W, D, F, \$P, S, OCT.

121. St. Peter's Lutheran Church

400 Sparks St.

Sat. 10 am to 4 pm/Sun. 12 pm to 4 pm

Erected in 1952, and built of sandstone from Nepean. Space designed by Cecil Burgess in the English Gothic Style. A Bell Carillon was installed in 2017, three swinging bells were installed in the tower in 2018, and the Casavant Organ was dedicated in 1977. Stained glass windows throughout are the work of Russell Goodman & Sons, installed between 1985 and 1993. Landscaping renovation was completed in 2010 for the 100th anniversary. 122. Stadacona Hall - Brunei High Commission

395 Laurier Ave. E.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

The two-and-a-half-storey Gothic Revival style limestone home was built in 1871 for lumber magnate John A. Cameron, who first rented the property to Joseph-Édouard Cauchon, a cabinet minister and first speaker of the Senate. In 1882, Sir John A. and Lady MacDonald lived there before moving to Earncliffe. It has also been home to the ambassadors of France and Belgium, and since 1996 it has been the High Commission of Brunei Darussalam. W, P, B, S, OCT.

123. Standard Bread Company, Gladstone Clayworks Co-operative

949B Gladstone Ave.

Sat. & Sun. 10 am to 4 pm

Built in 1924, the ground floor (east side) was converted into a pottery studio in 2003. The 1,800 sq ft co-operative studio now accommodates 25 ceramic artists who work together, sharing their experience and skill. 124. Standards Building

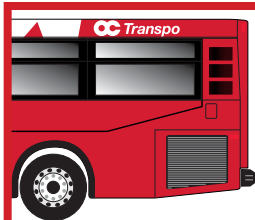

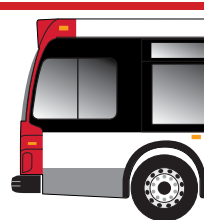
