# Appendix 1: List of stimulus programs currently funding infrastructure projects

Approximately \$79 million in funding has been approved through these programs:

### **Active Transportation Fund**

The federal government's Transportation Fund is investing in projects to make travel by active transportation easier, safer, more convenient, and more enjoyable.

The City of Ottawa has been approved to receive \$350,000 to fund seven feasibility studies that are ongoing.

### **Canada Community Revitalization Fund**

The City of Ottawa was approved to receive \$3,743,415 from the federal government through the Federal Economic Development Agency for Southern Ontario. This investment has improved accessibility, village and suburban sidewalks and pathways, many parks in priority neighborhoods, and the public realm with new lighting and benches.

These projects are now complete, with final reporting and last claims being submitted spring 2024.

### **Enabling Accessibility Fund**

The Enabling Accessibility Fund provides funding for projects that make Canadian communities and workplaces more accessible for persons with disabilities.

In 2023 the City of Ottawa received a grant of \$100,000 to fund part of an accessibility retrofit project at the City of Ottawa's By-law and Regulatory Services headquarters.

### Flood Hazard Identification & Mapping Program

The Flood Hazard Identification & Mapping Program provides funding to help Canadians better plan and prepare for future floods. FHIMP's goal is to complete flood hazard maps of Canada's higher risk areas and make the information accessible. In 2023 the City of Ottawa was approved for \$533,050 from the federal government through the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry for flood mapping in the Bear Brook and Castor River Watersheds.

### **Green and Inclusive Community Buildings**

The Green and Inclusive Community Buildings program objective is to support green and accessible retrofits, repairs, or upgrades to existing public community buildings and the construction of new publicly accessible community buildings that serve high-needs, underserved communities across Canada.

In 2022 the City of Ottawa was approved for \$630,000 from the federal government through the GICB program for the deep retrofit of the Hintonburg Community Centre. The building will become net-zero ready from improvements to the building envelope and new heating, cooling, and ventilation systems.

### **Green Municipal Fund**

The Federation of Canadian Municipalities, through the Green Municipal Fund, awarded the City of Ottawa \$50,500 to support a study to determine if using electric heating during the Ontario-wide grid off-peak hours would be significantly more affordable than staying with natural gas for facility space heating. The project was successfully completed in 2023 and has since been replicated at other city facilities.

# Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program – Community Culture and Recreation Stream

Since 2021, the City of Ottawa has been approved to receive \$39,194,666 from the federal and Provincial government to fund facility renovations and expansions, pool, and park projects.

### Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program– COVID-19 Resiliency

In 2021 the City of Ottawa was approved to receive \$19.2 million from the federal and Provincial government to fund retrofits, repairs and upgrades for municipal buildings, measures to support physical distancing, and projects to support active transportation such as parks, pathways, and bike lanes.

With many projects wrapping up under budget, a request to add scope to maximize our claims has been submitted to ICIP. At this time, the City has been approved to extend its agreements to the end of 2024.

## Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program – Long Term Care

In 2021 the City of Ottawa was approved to receive \$1.2 million from the federal and Provincial government to improve heating, ventilation, and HVAC systems at two long-term care homes.

### Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program, Public Transit Infrastructure Stream

In 2023, Infrastructure Canada accepted the City's application for an additional \$534,380 to fund more active transportation infrastructure enhancements; official approval is pending.

This program is currently contributing \$8,612,400 towards work on the Chief William

Commanda Bridge project.

### Sewage Overflow Monitoring and Reporting Grant

In 2022 the City of Ottawa was awarded \$1,089,128 to help improve the monitoring and public reporting capacity of sewage overflows and bypasses. This project is scheduled to be completed in 2024.

#### Strategic Priorities Infrastructure Fund

This program is funded by the Province of Ontario. In 2022 the City of Ottawa was approved to receive \$3,847,972 to expand the Larry Robinson Arena.
